

Director Duties (Board Members)

Excerpt from the Clubs By-Laws

“Article VI – Officers

- (a)There shall be a Board of Directors consisting of the immediate past president for a term of one year and four elected members for a term of three years each, one to be elected each year when their term expires. The Officers as the Executive Committee, and the 3 year term elected members as Board Members, acting together, shall constitute the Board of Directors.”

When a Director (Board Member) has been elected to office, it is understood that each one brings their own special talent or interest to the whole group. Directors can be a chair of one or more committees, leading the group of members to the established goal and reporting to the entire board of its progress. Interests may lie in the archery program, handgun program, or rifle programs. A Director may want to develop instructional programs for the youth and/or women and also promote SASS, IDPA, or IPSC matches.

Other committees may need to be set up for finding grants and applying for them. Being aware of the political and legal issues within the community, state and nation, are helpful to the relationship the Club has with its members.

Jobs within the board for a director to consider, newsletter editor, webmaster, assistant to the secretary & help keep membership records, Range Officer for the Indoor Range, research new developments for ranges, keep in touch with EPA rulings, work with DOW to provide information to our member hunters and the list continues depending on the director's enthusiasm toward the Club.

It is the main job of the Director to be well informed of the Board's activities and be able to explain to members when they inquire. (You're a spokesman and example for our Club members.) The entire Board of Directors should be diplomatic and courteous to those who request information and know the range rules, membership requirements, & practice safe weapon use.
